



A MESSAGE

FROM THE DIRECTOR AND THE BOARD PRESIDENT

As we enter a year of celebrations surrounding the Art Center's 75th anniversary, we can look back with pride on our accomplishments in 2022. It was another record-breaking year in many categories. Development and the Museum Shop met their fundraising and sales goals and ended the year with the best totals in our history. Our 75th anniversary campaign, which focused on art acquisitions, capital needs, and programming, exceeded its goals and is nearing completion. Community access and studio programs were back to pre-COVID attendance levels.

Exhibitions, museum education programs, and acquisitions were meaningful and community-based. Exhibitions included *Immersive*, which premiered the very popular *7even Stories High* digital elevator experience by the Des Moines-based artist Oyoram, and Images Unbound, which featured many works from our permanent collections. Alison Elizabeth Taylor's show of her extraordinary wood parguet panels opened in October 2022. Print gallery shows included Fantasy Figures: Surrealist Works from the Art Center's Collection, Modern Concepts 1910-1960, and Hold Me Closer. Our "lowa Artists" project in 2022 presented the work of Iowa City-based artist Miriam Alarcón Avila and showcased a personal view of the Mexican phenomenon of wrestling personas called luchadores.

The Art Center accessioned numerous artworks into the permanent collections through gifts and purchases

this past year. These accessions included paintings, drawings, prints, sculpture, and photographs by established masters as well as younger artists. Examples are artworks by James Van Der Zee, Alice Neel, Kehinde Wiley, Donté Hayes, Lari Pittman, Walker Evans, Lee Friedlander, Margaret Bourke-White, Helen McCloud (Gee's Bend quilt), Pao Houa Her, Charles Sheeler, Lyle Ashton Harris, Paul McCarthy, Paa Joe (Ghanaian fantasy coffin), Judy Pfaff, and William Eggleston. These artworks add significantly to our holdings while providing meaningful opportunities for diverse audiences to see themselves in the museum. An array of museum education programs enhanced our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion efforts as well. These included lectures, films, tours, and workshops, along with our 32nd Fingerman Lecture with artist Lari Pittman.

Finally, in late 2022, the Art Center was reaccredited by AAM, the American Alliance of Museums. Only about 7% of museums across the country receive this accreditation, so we are justifiably proud of this acknowledgement that our procedures and policies follow best practices in the field.

Thank you for your participation and support throughout this past year and for the past 25 years that I have had the privilege of working at the Art Center. We are now ready to begin our next 75 years. We invite you to join us and to continue to support the museum and school under its new leadership.

NEW ACCESSIONS

To advance the Art Center's goal of both celebrating and expanding the diversity of the collections, the museum accessioned 101 works of art in 2022 by artists whose heritage and background span the globe. New accessions provide our visitors the opportunity to see themselves in the galleries. Over the past three years, more than 90% of our new purchases were artworks by Asian, Black, Indigenous, Latinx, Queer, or women artists.

Accessions included major works of photography, mixed-media, sculpture, prints and drawings, and works on paper. The following represents a selection of these works. CONSERVATION PROJECTS

Several major conservation projects occurred in 2022 at both the museum and Pappajohn Sculpture Park. Conservation of these works allows the Art Center to tell the story of our past and carry the artists' voices into the future. Treated works included Carl Milles' *Man and Pegasus* (1949), one of the first sculptures gifted to the Art Center, and a recent acquisition, *Hurricane from the south* (1991), by Arnaldo Roche-Rabel.

A survey of sculptures in the Pappajohn Sculpture Park was also completed by the Midwest Art Conservation Center in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Treatment was completed on Tony Smith's *Marriage* (1961, fabricated 1989) and restoration of *Willy* (1962, fabricated 2005) will be completed in 2023.

ANNUAL REPORT 2022 | 9

The Art Center's exhibitions in 2022 provided visitors new perspectives on art and created space for dialogue. Opportunities to interact with visiting artists and the exhibitions abounded. Visitors could share memories through postcards and online galleries, attend lectures and panels with artists involved in major exhibitions, and take prints and gallery guides home to remember the impact of their visit. We are thankful to our many sponsors, members, and donors for their support of these exhibitions that set the tone for the institution over the year.

IMMERSIVE

March 11 – June 5, 2022 Anna K. Meredith Gallery and Bookey Gallery Organized by Senior Curator Laura Burkhalter

Immersive was a four-part exhibition of large-scale works and installations featuring artists Bill Viola, Ran Hwang, Matthew Willie Garcia, and Oyoram. This multipart experiential exhibition invited visitors to be literally immersed in artworks from the permanent collections and beyond. Instead of moving through traditional gallery spaces, visitors followed a path from darkened space to darkened space, each filled with light, color, and sound.

Artists involved in exhibition programming included Kansas City-based guest artist Matthew Willie Garcia and Des Moines-based multimedia artist and Toni and Tim Urban International Artist-in-Residence, Oyoram, who installed a room of LED monitors that transported the viewer into a surprising, ground-shifting experience—*Teven Stories High.* Community programming including meditative sound baths with musicians Deb Jennings and Justin Appel were offered in multiple spaces throughout the museum to create more opportunities for immersion.

The *Immersive* exhibition and related programming was developed with two goals in mind: 1) to create new ways of viewing and experiencing art from the Des Moines Art Center's permanent collections, and 2) to explore immersive environments created by artists that allowed participants to reflect on their own immersive quarantine environments that may have been everything from safe and productive to overwhelming and exhausting. Visitors had the opportunity to respond to the artworks and share their perspectives with others. Hundreds of visitors completed postcards that were hung on a wall to showcase responses to the artworks. Reflection prompts included "This artwork made me

feel...," "Some words that come to mind about this artwork are...," or "A personal connection I made to this artwork is..." Cards were available in both English and Spanish. The activity provided a space to respond to the exhibition on a more personal level, evoking emotions and connections with each piece.

One participant responded that the Matthew Willie Garcia installation made them feel "like I am in another world." Another noted the work made them feel "Far out! Far out in space, time, life, death, and the universe. Far out!"

A viewer of Bill Viola's *Ascension* felt "a breathless sensation of floating and being 100% serene for a moment. Powerful." Others said they felt scared or frightened, but one noted, "At first I felt my chest tighten, but looking at the bubbles reminded me...I am alive."

Ran Hwang's *Garden of Water* inspired feelings of peace, meditation, and elegance, while the spiders engendered thoughts ranging from time, death, and darkness to the whimsy of the nursery rhyme, "The Itsy Bitsy Spider."

Oyoram's installation, *7even Stories High*, evoked many responses related to our connection with nature and evolution. One viewer wondered, "To what extent am I comfortable with exchanging the beauty of nature for the appeal of modernity and a faux representation of the world?"

ENTIRELY KIDS DAY: FIND YOURSELF INSIDE ART

Entirely Kids Day offers a day's worth of child-focused thematic art experiences in the museum and studio spaces. The theme of the spring 2022 Entirely Kids Day was "Find Yourself Inside Art" and featured interactive museum exploration and a tour of *Immersive*, handson art activities, engaging story times, performances by Eulenspiegel Puppet Theater, and a virtual reality experience provided by Iowa State University's FLEx program. These opportunities encouraged new audiences to create memories at the Art Center; more than 1,200 children, adults, and families explored the museum during the event in March, many for the first time.



IMAGES UNBOUND

June 24 – September 25, 2022 Anna K. Meredith Gallery and Bookey Gallery Organized by Associate Curator Mia Laufer

Images Unbound presented artwork from the Des Moines Art Center's permanent collections that touched upon themes of reproducibility, the art object's uniqueness, or the effects of urbanization. The exhibition played with themes from German philosopher Walter Benjamin's (1892–1940) seminal essay "The Work of Art in the Age of Mechanical Reproduction." Artists featured in Images Unbound included Frank Big Bear, Walker Evans, Hannah Höch, and Andy Warhol, among many others. Images Unbound was the first exhibition by Associate Curator Mia Laufer for the Des Moines Art Center.

The exhibition featured several artworks that included reproductions for visitors to take home or interact with. Artist Félix González-Torres created a "paper stack" as part of an interactive art piece; Xavier Tavera and Bobby Marines collaborated to create a newspaper depicting the latter's hometown of Robstown, Texas, ROBE 2022; and visitors were invited to create "mail art" from postcards with artwork featured in the show. Participants wrote notes on the cards and left them with the museum. At the end of the show, the postcards were addressed at random and sent to other museum guests who had also participated in the activity.

ARTIST PANEL DISCUSSION: WHO OWNS IMAGES?

What makes a work of art any different than the thousands of images that enter our homes every day? Photographs, photocopies, prints, the internet, television, and cell phones; in a world of endless and easy reproduction, how does the artist create and challenge ideas around images, their value, and their impact on the audience who consumes them?

Four artists whose works were featured in *Images Unbound* investigated these questions in a dynamic conversation led by Museum Educator Mia Buch and featuring artists Anna Gaskell, Bobby Marines, Xavier Tavera, and Ignatius Widiapradja.



A pop-up event inspired by *Images Unbound* and the "Who Owns Images?" panel allowed visitors to explore new technologies in art; specifically, how Al text-to-image generators create new artworks. Participants created their own artworks using text prompts and discussed the opportunities and risks associated with this new technology. This image was generated by using a prompt to create iterations of flowers in the Cubist style.

ART AND ACTIVISM

The Art Center held an "Art & Activism" workshop with 15 teens over one weekend (July 30–31, 2022) led by Latinx artists Xavier Tavera and Bobby Marines, who were featured in the exhibition *Images Unbound*. The students explored how the use of photography, printing, and publication can shed light on challenging events in marginalized populations and how they can collectively heal and rise from adversity and tragedy. A printed publication or "Zine" was also developed as part of the installation. The group installation centered around current events impacting Des Moines' many diverse communities. The project was conceived of and executed by Marines, Tavera, and the students, and was displayed in the education wing; several of their works are featured on the cover of this report.

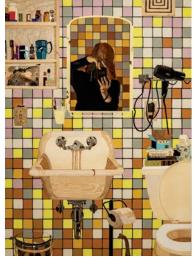
ALISON ELIZABETH TAYLOR: THE SUM OF IT

October 14, 2022 – January 15, 2023 Anna K. Meredith Gallery Organized by the Addison Gallery of American Art, Massachusetts

Known for her daring and inventive fusion of the centuries-old practice of marquetry (wood inlay) with gritty and provocative subject matter, Alison Elizabeth Taylor tells tales that are unequivocally modern. *The Sum of It*, the most comprehensive gathering of her work to date, assembled dozens of works that chronicled her steady mastery of the now nearly forgotten techniques of this rarified medium and revealed her talent as an extraordinary storyteller of 21st-century American life and culture. The exhibition was comprised of a room-sized installation and approximately 40 large-scale works by Taylor, including the Des Moines Art Center's *The Breeder*, exploring her compelling narratives of American culture.

A native Nevadan who grew up through boomand-bust cycles in Las Vegas, Taylor casts a critical and compassionate eye across a range of human experience. Her works depict the rugged and storied southwestern landscape and the survivalists, scavengers, and economic misfits of American capitalism who inhabit it. Recently Taylor's subject matter has expanded to include the resilience of her urban Brookyln neighborhood during the pandemic.

The works traced the evolution of the artist's practice from early paintings informed by the grains and tones of natural woods to more vividly colored works that layer marquetry, paint, and photographic imagery. In our current moment of social and political upheaval, Taylor's innovative work insists on our sustained gaze and empathetic study. She states, "The splendor of the shellacked wood is an invitation to look at subjects the viewer might otherwise ignore." Alison Elizabeth Taylor explored her work and these themes in a keynote lecture at the Art Center.

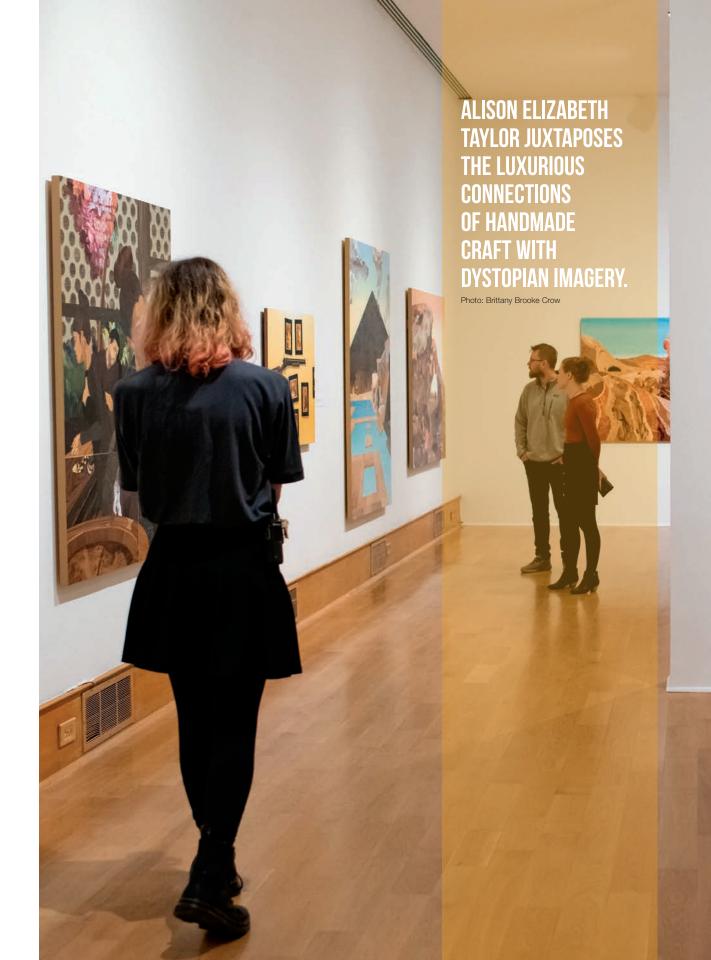

BEING WITH ART

Visitors were astonished by the vibrancy and detail in Taylor's work. Volunteer docents (tour guides) and visitor experience staff noted that children and adults alike lingered at each work, absorbing details and appreciating the artistry. In one instance, two visitors were intrigued by legible labels on medicine bottles at the top of a shelf in the title work, *The Sum of It,* a self-portrait of the artist in her bathroom.

These opportunities for reflection and connection are emphasized throughout the Art Center's curatorial and programmatic offerings. *Being with Art*, an audio program launched in 2022, supports visitors with thoughtful, guided prompts, turning their museum visit into a peaceful, inspiring, and embodied experience. Grounded in mindfulness and slow looking practices, *Being with Art* helps museum goers slow down, relax, and enjoy the presence of modern and contemporary art while heightening awareness to how art makes us think, feel, and respond. While the program focuses on the permanent collections, visitors can take these practices into any opportunity to view art. The 20-minute audio program is available in both English and Spanish.



IOWA ARTISTS 2022: MIRIAM ALARCÓN AVILA

October 28, 2022 – January 15, 2023 Krause Atrium, Lower Meier Galleries, and Bookey Gallery

Miriam Alarcón Avila is a photographer and a visual, multimedia, and storytelling artist. Her work gives voice to new lowans and highlights the challenges and heritage of Latinx immigrants. Alarcón Avila's work honors the double meaning of the word *lucha*: it is the name of the popular wrestling sport, as well as the ability to use your whole heart and soul to overcome struggles and obstacles. Her exhibition for the lowa Artists series featured photography, luchador masks, the stories and poems on which Alarcón Avila bases her imagery, and a video capturing collaborations with her subjects.





DAY OF THE DEAD, HONORING OUR LUCHADORES ANCESTORS

Miriam Alarcón Avila also created the ofrenda for the annual Day of the Dead celebration, with a theme of honoring our luchadores ancestors. Day of the Dead celebrations honor those who came before us, our ancestors, and those we have loved and lost.

The event was the largest single-day event held at the Art Center since the pandemic in 2020, with a total attendance of more than 1,400. Participants explored the museum and ofrenda centerpiece, created paper flowers and luchador masks, enjoyed music and refreshments, viewed films honoring and celebrating lives in our Latino community, and participated in a festive processional.

FANTASY FIGURES: SURREALIST WORKS ON PAPER FROM THE ART CENTER'S COLLECTION

October 1, 2021 – March 20, 2022 John Brady Print Gallery Organized by Senior Curator Laura Burkhalter

Surrealism is one of the most popular and well-known 20th-century art movements. Its chaotic and mysterious imagery, inspired by dreams, fantasies, and the unconscious influenced not only generations of artists but writers and filmmakers as well as fashion and game design.

Dating mainly from the 1930s to the 1960s and featuring drawing, collage, and various printmaking techniques, many of the works in this exhibition included takes on the human body. Artists in the exhibition included Salvador Dalí, Joan Miró, Louise Bourgeois, and Dorothea Tanning, among many others.

MODERN CONCEPTS 1910-1960

March 25 – July 31, 2022 John Brady Print Gallery Curated by John and Mary Pappajohn Director Jeff Fleming

Modernism was both an approach to artmaking as well as a mindset that focused on the new. The artworks in this exhibition, all drawn from the Art Center's permanent collections, illustrated four subject areas: abstraction, city life, figuration, and landscape. Many of the works grappled with the political or social undercurrents of the early 20th century, including the trauma of war and global economic and ecological concerns. Natalia Goncharova, Edward Hopper, Paul Klee, Diego Rivera, and Bill Traylor were some of the many artists included in the show. This was the final show curated by John and Mary Pappajohn Director Jeff Fleming for the Des Moines Art Center before his retirement.

HOLD ME CLOSER

August 5 - December 11, 2022

John Brady Print Gallery

Organized by Associate Curator Mia Laufer

Coming off the heels of years of social distancing and isolation, this exhibition addressed different emotional tones associated with close, interpersonal contact, from jubilant and saccharine, to bittersweet, melancholic, or unsettling. The show featured work from the mid-19th century through the present by Mary Cassatt, Elizabeth Catlett, Larry Fink, Käthe Kollwitz, Danny Lyon, Robert Mapplethorpe, Edvard Munch, Deana Lawson, and many others.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

From its founding in 1948, the Des Moines Art Center has been a place to learn about contemporary art through the practice of viewing and making art. As part of the Art Center's opening, architect Eliel Saarinen reflected on the philosophy behind the new building, noting that "Buildings are nothing, studios are nothing, unless you use them to full advantage." The Art Center's vision is to create an inclusive space that builds experiences, fosters relationships, and stimulates creative, critical, and empathetic thinking.

In 2022, we enacted that vision through new programs that uplift diverse voices. More than 269,000 visitors were welcomed to the museum and Pappajohn Sculpture Park and invited to utilize the full advantage of our studio classes, programs, and exhibitions.

MY VOICE

My Voice is an exploration that invites youth to gather, question, and experience the ways that museums and art can serve as tools for creative and critical thinking, self-reflection, mindfulness, and shared human connection. Twelve students from participating schools—Findley Elementary School, Harding Middle School, and North High School—were supported by the Des

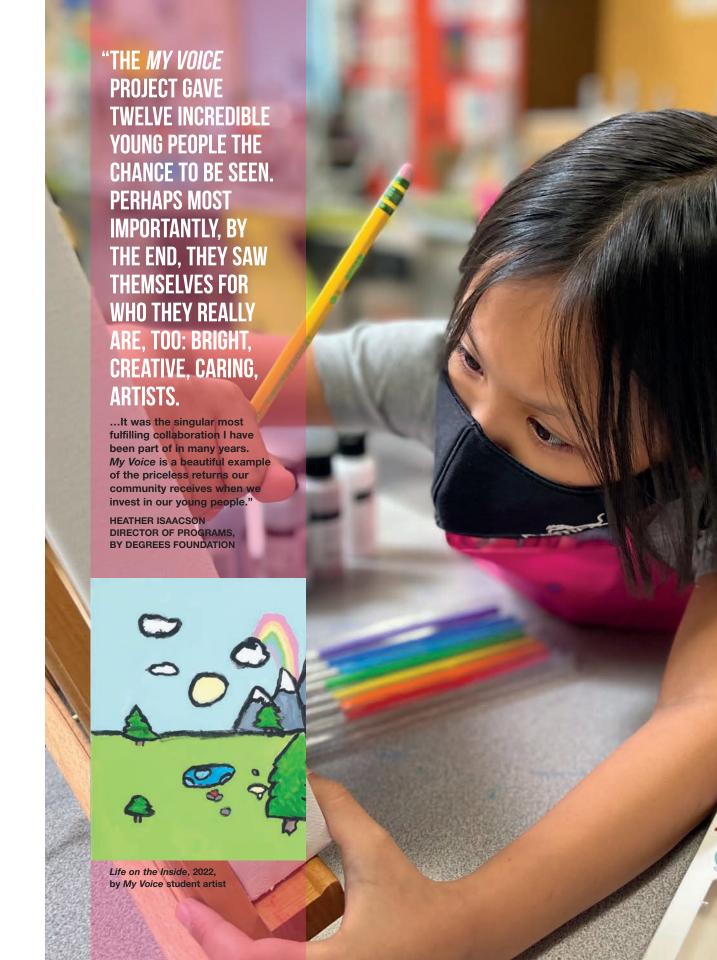

DES MOINES SPEAKS

Des Moines Speaks is a new program that offers opportunities for multiple interpretations of artwork and reinforces the idea that there is no wrong way to experience art. Members of CultureALL, a Des Moines non-profit that encourages lowans to participate in cultural traditions that lead to a greater appreciation for the diversity around them, were selected to record their personal interpretations of a work in the permanent collection. The audio files are available via QR code on exhibition labels. The program encourages the public to not only use the curatorial voice as a guide for looking but to also view the art through the lens of their own story and vision.





COMMUNITY IMPACT

32ND FINGERMAN LECTURE

"Conjectural Thinking and the Look of Meaning" was the topic of discussion in the 32nd annual Fingerman Lecture series at the Des Moines Art Center, held on October 18, 2022, and available on the Art Center's YouTube channel. The conversation between Artist Lari Pittman and Jeff Fleming, John and Mary Pappajohn Director, explored the connection between language and imagery, the willingness to project into the future, and the forces behind Pittman's "history paintings of the now."

Lari Pittman is a Colombian-American contemporary artist and painter and Emeritus Distinguished Professor of Painting and Drawing at the UCLA School of the Arts and Architecture. He draws from elements of commercial advertising, the decorative arts, and history painting to produce large-scale works. *Untitled #3* (*In the Garden*) was accessioned into the Art Center's collections in 2022.

NEW PARTNERSHIP: DES MOINES PARKS AND RECREATION

The Art Center's Community Access programs utilize art education to encourage participants to build resiliency and support the exploration of selfhood, community, and identity. The program is built on a history of new and existing relationships with other social service, educational, and non-profit partners. As we rebuild connections with partners following the pandemic, we have also been able to respond to new requests for access programs.

In 2022, the Art Center collaborated in a new program with Des Moines Parks and Recreation, whose mission is to provide equitable recreation services in city parks. During the summer, the city rolled out a summer camp program in four parks: MLK Jr. Park, Evelyn K. Davis Park, Drake Park, and Weeks Middle School Park. Campers received two weeks of programming from the Art Center. The first week the campers were led through an art activity at their park by an Access teaching artist, and the following week the campers engaged in an on-site tour of the Art Center's collections and exhibitions, with an emphasis on themes explored in the first week.



Thanks to donor and member support, the Art Center is free and accessible to all. The Art Center offers several branches of educational programming: museum education, studio education, and community access. Community Access is free programming that makes art and art making accessible to those in our community who otherwise lack access due to social, cultural, environmental, and economic barriers through partnerships with over 40 organizations.

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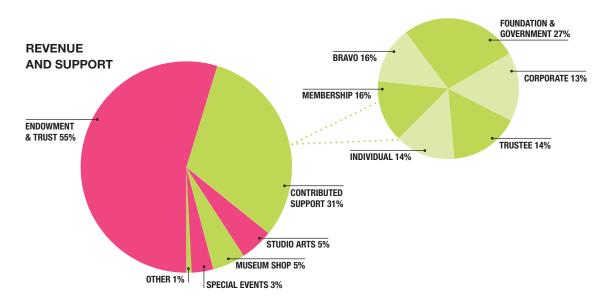
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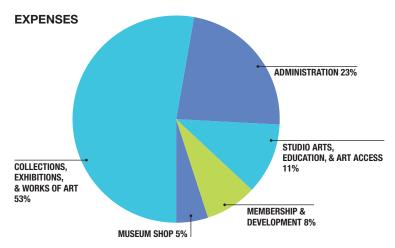
